Before You Leave

Moving to a new country provides different challenges. We understand that you may have questions about preparing for your stay in Australia. There are some important things you need to know before you leave that will make for a better experience when you arrive.

Money matters

The amount of money you bring with you is a personal decision. The estimated cost of living for students in Newcastle is approximately AUD \$19,000 per year. You must make sure you have enough funds to cover your bond/rent and moving in expenses for your accommodation on arrival. You should also have money to cover expenses such as temporary accommodation (if applicable), meals and transport (public transport, taxis). However, you should not carry large amounts of cash with you. Check studyinaustralia. gov.au for more information.

Health

Make sure your immunisations are up to date before you leave. Have a dental check-up also as this may be less expensive in your own country.

Clothing

Students dress casually for classes. November to March are the warmest months and you will be comfortable in casual clothing such as light pants, shorts, skirts, shirts and jeans. June to August are the coldest months and you will be comfortable in clothing such as jeans, trousers, skirts, jumpers (sweaters/windcheaters/coat). A light waterproof jacket is also useful.

You should bring some nice clothes for formal events.

Electrical current

Electrical goods, such as computers, may be less expensive to buy overseas than in Australia and can be brought with you. Appliances rated 220 – 240 volts generally perform satisfactorily with the mains power supply in Australia. To make sure that you are able to use all your electrical appliances bring a converter and an adaptor with you, or alternatively you can purchase an adaptor upon your arrival from travel stores or some supermarkets.

Excess baggage

We recommend you check with your travel agent or airline regarding excess baggage.


You must bring proof of your travel insurance lose any documentation during your stay.

☐ AUD cash

Store a reasonable amount of cash (around AUD\$200 – \$300) on your body or in your hand luggage. Try to avoid counting or pulling out your money in busy public places.

☐ Appropriate clothing

Wear a number of layers of clothing on your flight in case the weather is hot upon arrival.



□ College emergency number

☐ Prescription medication

Bring medical history or prescriptions required for ongoing medication translated into English. Pack medication carefully in full packaging in case you are asked questions at customs on your departure from your home country or arrival in Australia.



When you arrive

Arriving at the airport of a foreign country can be a little overwhelming. There's no need to feel shy about asking for help: most airport staff will be happy to help you.

Quarantine

Australia has a unique environment that is free from many of the diseases and pests found elsewhere in the world. If you are visiting Australia, you must be aware of Australian quarantine laws.

- On entering Australia you are required to complete an Incoming Passenger Card. You must read it carefully and complete the form truthfully.
- ALL animal and plant products, including food items, must be declared for inspection and in most cases will be returned.

Airport pick-up

At the College, we offer a free airport pick-up from Newcastle Williamstown Airport.

Provide your full name, arrival date, flight number and time and a contact number and we will send you the confirmation. Please note that you need to book this at least 7 days in advance to guarantee your airport pick-up.

A new double story international terminal is under construction at Newcastle Williamstown Airport. We recommend students fly into Brisbane or Melbourne and then catch a 1 hour domestic flight to Newcastle.


Accommodation

If you want to discuss accommodation options, the Student Experience team will be happy to assist you with:

- homestays
- student residences
- · independent rentals

Students who stay in homestay not only have a great experience living in a family environment, but they will improve their English and get to learn more about Aussie culture in Newcastle, your new home.

Students under 18 will stay in a homestay until they turn 18.



Bank account

Students wishing to transfer money from overseas will need to:

- Complete either a telegraphic transfer or bank draft
- Know and include the BSB and account number for the account in which they wish to make a deposit
- Check with the relevant bank as to how long the transfer will take. Bank drafts can take 6-8 weeks to process and there may be fees involved for both transactions.

When shopping, both EFTPOS (Electronic Funds Transfer at Point of Sale) and major credit cards are widely used in Australia.

The Student Experience team will be happy to assist you if you need help.

Opening a bank account

Students can open an Australian bank account from their home country. A number of Australian banks offer this service online. To open a bank account once you're in Australia, you will need to complete a 100-point identity check. To do this you will need to provide identification, such as your passport, student card, birth certificate, driver's licence, credit card, phone or electricity bill.



Student bank accounts

Most banks and credit unions offer student accounts with lower fees (and lower rates of interest). You will account. Make sure to ask if they have any limitations, such as maximum amounts on daily withdrawals.

Tip 1 - Research

When setting up a SIM card in Australia you should first research different phone companies to find the provider that best suits your needs and budget.

Tip 2 – Identity documents

Make sure you take identification documents such as your passport, visa, bank account statements,

Tip 3 – Contract vs. pre-paid

SIM cards are available in two general forms in Australia: (1) pre-paid and (2) contract. 1. Pre-paid SIM cards require you to pay an upfront fee and register the SIM yourself. You then pay for extra credit when you need it. Credit can generally be purchased online, or at convenience stores, supermarkets and service (petrol) stations.

2. Contract SIM cards, as their name suggests, lock you into a contract with a phone provider for a certain period of time (usually 24 months). You will be required to pay a certain dollar amount every month, which gives you a set amount of data and call time. Breaking the contract will likely mean that you will need to pay out the rest of your contract as an early termination fee.

Tip 4 - Unlocking your phone

Be careful! If you are using the handset from your home country, you may need to first unlock your phone so that it can use an Australian SIM card. You will need to contact your mobile phone provider in your home country for instructions on how to do this.

Tip 5 - Dual-SIMs

Some mobile phones allow dual-SIMs, which means you can install one SIM card for local calls and one SIM card for international calls. There are a number of mobile network providers including:

Your first day

Your first day will help you become acquainted with the College and studying in Newcastle. Please remember to bring your passport and current Australian address.

Orientation

We look forward to welcoming you to the College at orientation. Orientation will usually be face to face unless there are circumstances that prevent you from attending (e.g. there are travel bans in place restricting international flights, borders are closed, your visa hasn't arrived yet etc). In those cases, you can attend Orientation online via Zoom.

You will receive an email, around two weeks, prior to your orientation containing more details and the orientation schedule.

What will I do at orientation?

We will finalise your enrolment and help you get set up as a College student. There will be some important information sessions during the week that you are required to attend, as well as some tasks that you will need to complete, including:

- · Enrolment into course of study
- Campus tours
- · College and University services and facilities
- Details of local transport
- Student responsibilities
- · Overseas Student Health Cover
- Student ID card
- · Living in Newcastle
- Safety training

Under 18 students

Australian law considers international students under the age of 18 to be minors and as such the College takes special care of their welfare and development. Students who are minors must stay in their approved accommodation until they turn 18 years of age. Students having any concerns or queries must liaise with the Student Experience Team who will assist with their welfare and general support arrangements.

You will meet with a College staff member on a regular basis to check on your welfare status.

What to expect?

Starting your studies in Australia may be a challenging experience. You may need time to adjust to new teaching styles and new expectations, such as:

- · Contributing to class discussions
- · Being an independent learner
- Thinking creatively
- Expressing your views and feelings
- Asking questions
- · Planning and managing your time effectively
- Completing all types of program assessment (i.e. essays/assignments/oral presentations).

PASS

PASS (Peer Assisted Study Sessions) is an organisation by the University which supports international students studying in Newcastle. If you want to compare notes, discuss difficult concepts and review weekly material with other students, PASS can help.

Step 3: Catch a ride

When catching the bus you will usually enter using the front door, but for the tram and train, you can use any door to enter. Upon entering the vehicle, you need to validate your trip by tapping your card on the yellow validation machines found just inside the door.

Step 4: Stop!

In the bus, you have to press the button to stop the bus. Trains will stop automatically at all stations.

Beach safety

Australian beaches are unpredictable and have hidden dangers that you should be aware of. Take the time to learn how to have a safe and fun trip to the beach.

Beach safety tips:

Always swim between the red and yellow flags at beaches with patrolling lifeguards.

- Never swim alone.
- Read and obey the signs
- · Don't swim directly after a meal.
- · Don't swim under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- Always check the depth of the water.
- If you get into trouble in the water, stay calm. Signal for help by waving your arm and wait for assistance.


Student Health

If you or a friend are seriously ill and need an ambulance call 000. Stay calm and describe to the operator on the line what type of assistance you need (ambulance, fire or police) and your location. You may be required to describe any symptoms. Explain as much as you can, do not worry if you are not confident with your English, say as much as you can, as clearly as you can.

Medicines

Pharmaceutical products in Australia may be more expensive than in your home country. Medications such as antibiotics and antihistamines will ¬require a doctor's prescription and may cost approximately AUD \$25 for a course. Some milder antihistamines may be bought overthe- counter and may cost around AUD \$15.

A pain-relieving tablet such as paracetamol or aspirin may be purchased without prescription at supermarkets.



Overseas Student Health Cover

The Department of Home Affairs requires all international students to be covered by health insurance for the entire duration of their stay in Australia. This is arranged through the Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) scheme. OSHC is insurance that provides cover for the costs for medical and hospital care which international students may need while in Australia. The College of International Education's preferred provider is Bupa Australia. This insurance covers:

- · Visits to a doctor (approximately 85% of the scheduled fee)
- The total cost of hospital treatment provided that the treatment is in a public hospital and is provided by a hospital doctor
- · Other medical services such as pathology and radiology
- · Emergency ambulance transport.

If you are feeling sick or have a medical issue that is not an emergency, then a doctor – also called GP (General Practitioner) should be your first point of contact.

The University provides a GP for all students, located on Level 1, Student Services Centre at Callaghan campus. You should take with you to your first appointment:

- student ID Card
- OSHC card
- · list of medications you are currently taking
- list of vaccinations you may have received in the past.

If you are a Bupa member, you may wish to visit a GP within the Bupa Network as you will receive discounted rates. To find a GP in your local area visit oshc bupa.com.au/health-insurance/oshc.

Is it an emergency?

If you require the opinion of a nurse as to whether you need to attend the doctor or hospital, call Health Direct Australia on 1800 022 222 to speak with a qualified nurse. An interpreter is available.

Medical costs

Medical costs are at the discretion of your local doctor or hospital.



This insurance does not cover:

- Dental costs
- Physiotherapy
- Optical glasses, contact lenses
- Medical expenses for any pre-existing medical condition that you had before you came to Australia, during the first 12 months of membership
- Treatment covered by provisions for compensation and damages or accidents
- Pre-screening in the first 12 months Please see the Student Experience Team or your OSHC provider for more information.



More information

- If you would like to renew or increase the length of your OSHC, please contact Bupa.
- If you would like extra cover for items not covered e.g. dental, physiotherapy, optometry (glasses, contact lenses), you may wish to take out extras cover for an extra cost.
- If you change your address while living in Australia you should notify Bupa within seven days.
- If the doctor you visit does not accept your Bupa card, please pay the bill in full for your visit, and collect your receipt. Then take your receipt to any Bupa Australia branch where you can apply for a rebate. If you have any questions visit the Bupa Australia website at oshc.bupa.com.au or call 1800 888 942 (24 hours) from within Australia.

Laws

- In Australia no one under the age of 18 may buy or drink alcohol. It is against the law to buy alcohol for someone you know is under the age of 18.
- Driving under the influence of alcohol is a serious crime and police make regular random checks.
- · Buying, selling and using drugs is illegal.

Customs

Customs are an accepted way of behaviour in a country. You need to know the customs of Australia to help you feel comfortable with people. Some important customs to know include:

- Please and Thank you: It is very important to use these words when asking or receiving gifts or favours.
- Women: Women in Australia are equal to men and should always be treated fairly.
- Men and women share equally in household work and childcare.
- Queues: Always stand in line and wait your turn when buying tickets, in a bank, post office or waiting for a bus. Keep to the left when standing on escalators or when walking/cycling on public pathways.
- Friendliness: Australian people talk to strangers in public areas. This is a great way to practise English, but caution should be taken. You should not give out your address and telephone number, or accept inappropriate invitations.
- Workplace Etiquette: Australians use a firm handshake when meeting someone for the first time. In the workplace, as with many situations, Australians will address one another using only first names. Eye contact is very important in conversation.
- Clothing: Clothing is an individual choice.
 Australian people dress for comfort, weather or social occasion



Your responsibilities

As an overseas student on a student visa, you have responsibilities to:

- Satisfy your Student Visa conditions
- Maintain your Overseas Student Health
- Cover (OSHC) for the period of your stay
- the College
- Inform the College if you change your address or phone number
- during your course
- accommodation, support and general welfare

While some Australian customs are influenced by English traditions and the predominant religion, Christianity, Australia has a growing multicultural population with different religions and faiths.

Values in Australian society

· Rights of the individual

It is illegal to smoke in any public building in Australia, including toilets and fire stairs. If you wish to smoke, it is polite to be at least four metres away from building entrances, and you must put all cigarette butts in a bin.

If you set off a fire alarm in the building by smoking, you will be liable for the costs, e.g. Metropolitan Fire Service call out fees.
